

Solving Trigonometric Equations

The goal of solving trigonometric equations is to isolate the trigonometric function involved in the equation by using standard algebraic techniques. Once isolated, we can apply inverse trigonometric functions or use known values to determine the solution. We must also consider the periodic nature of trigonometric functions when identifying all possible solutions within a given interval.
